### MISHAP BRIEFS

#### PMV-4

A Sergeant assigned to Andersen Air Force Base, Guam, died in a PMV-4 mishap in Yigo, Guam, at 0100 local. The Soldier was presumed to be driving at a high rate of speed when his vehicle left the roadway and struck a cement guard pole. Local police and emergency medical technicians responded to the mishap scene and pronounced the Soldier dead.

Since 2016, the Army has lost an average of 31 Soldiers a year to PMV-4 mishaps. Speed or speed combined with alcohol has been the leading causal factor in nearly 40 percent of all fatal PMV-4 crashes over the last five years.
